A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

In reflecting on the past year, and the fact that we are still faced with uncertainties related to COVID-19, the theme of this year's report is to highlight both the stark reality of today and hope for tomorrow as we move forward together.

I would like to communicate two important messages; First, Kids Kottage's objectives. Kids Kottage Foundation promotes the well-being of children by preventing child-abuse, neglect, maltreatment and exposure to trauma - we exist to keep infants and children safe and families strong. Second, all of the ways that our organization has been navigating through the pandemic. It is a remarkable story of evolution through resiliency of our team members in the face of adversity.

Evolving and Resilience in the Time of COVID-19

We continue to be inspired every day by the resilience and bravery of the clients who come to us for support and the children who stay in our care. We continue to offer these caregivers our compassion, and guidance as we support them in keeping their infants and children safe. This year, an important part of that support has been forming relationships with other resources and community agencies. Together we help our clients navigate these critical pathways to ensure their children are given every opportunity to thrive. Kids Kottage Foundation is a bridge. We bridge the gap over what often feels like a chasm, for the families we support. I like to think this is a bridge where no one is left behind.

But what does it mean to build resilience together in a global pandemic? Most often someone overcoming adversity comes to mind. Or, in the case of the many infants and children we shelter, we think of traumatic childhood experiences. One trend we have noticed is that the majority of our clients are dealing with issues that are related to poverty and trauma. This includes homelessness, food insecurity, a lack of diapers in the home, no utilities and the list goes on.

Lock-downs put more stress into an already volatile environment. Children staying home from school, and caregivers unable to work caused tensions that reached toxic levels across the board. We are just now seeing the impact this pandemic has had on our children's mental health. According to Children First Canada, 70% of children aged 6-18 have reported COVID-19 has had an impact on their mental health, and the number of suicide attempt admissions have increased by 100% on average among children during the pandemic.

At Kids Kottage, we know that the effects of trauma on a child's developing mind may linger for the rest of their life. We are an early intervention and prevention essential service that keeps infants and children safe and families strong. As humans, we all have empathy and have survived many disruptive historical events. We have continued to evolve – not because we are independent and alone, but by working together and building a community of support. The last 15 months have served as a reminder of the deep and profound impact service to our community can have, especially to the most vulnerable, infants and children. We are determined to remain vigilant and dedicated to our mission statement. All children have inherent value as individuals, and it is our duty to champion and protect their rights.

I would like to profoundly thank and acknowledge the people we serve – all of the infants, children, families, and guardians; as well as our stellar Board of Directors for their patience, kindness, creativity, and support during this pandemic. So many people have dedicated time and resources that have allowed us to serve our community, and I feel eternally grateful for everyone's continued support. As you might guess, this has been an exceptionally difficult time – but the unwavering dedication of everyone at Kids Kottage Foundation to ensure infants and children are protected and supported has given me unending amounts of hope and gratitude. 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A LETTER FROM THE FUND DEVELOPMENT MANAGER

While the 2020-2021 fiscal year had its challenges, there were still so many wonderful moments that took place. Even in the midst of a pandemic, our community has rallied together to make a huge impact on the most vulnerable among us.

Over the past year, Kids Kottage celebrated its 25th year of serving Edmonton and area's most vulnerable infants, children and families; started a web series called KottageVision to highlight individuals and organizations who are making an impact in our community; and received invaluable support from so many fellow Edmontonians, community leaders, organizations, and donors.

Here are a few of the major highlights from the past year:

25th Anniversary

Since June of 1995, Kids Kottage has sheltered over 30,000 infants and children and helped over 14,000 families. Our organization might look a little bit different today than it did 25 years ago - the Kottage itself has grown, our programs have expanded, community partnerships have been forged - but our heart and mission to keep infants and children safe and families strong, remains unchanged.

To kick off our 25th year of keeping our community's most vulnerable safe, we worked together with Mammoet, Telus World of Science Edmonton, and some of our generous volunteers, to deliver 25 baskets to 25 families we have served over the years.

Radiothon

Our 26th annual Radiothon event served as our main fundraising event, as the rest of the 2020/2021 fiscal year events were cancelled. With that, we knew we needed to aim high in order to reach funding goals. When we set our Radiothon fundraising goal at an ambitious \$100,000, we knew it was a high expectation, especially with uncertainties during the pandemic. Our community rallied together and more than DOUBLED our initial goal. To say we were blown away by the support we received throughout this fundraiser would be an understatement. Together, our community helped us raise \$255,000 for infants, children and families in need. For that, we are so grateful.



COVID-19

With the warmer weather and sunshine, it is difficult to imagine that the world is still in the grasp of a global pandemic and crushing economic crisis.

From all corners, people, and most aspects of life have been impacted by COVID-19, but none as harshly as the most vulnerable among us - infants and children.

One thing that has remained unchanged is Kids Kottage Foundation's commitment to supporting our community's most vulnerable and their caregivers.

Throughout this past year, the Crisis Nursery saw families who were experiencing crises such as domestic and family violence, poverty, and parental physical and mental health. The crisis line and the Follow-up Program were essential in providing these families with critical pathways to get them out of crisis. We remained vigilant in keeping alignment with all Alberta Health Services health orders and guidance.

Throughout the past year, 70% of the children who were in crisis were of Indigenous descent. 72% of the children who experienced crisis came from a single parent family. These families were living either at, or close to the poverty level.

We are grateful for the support that enabled us to keep hundreds of infants and children safe and support those families in need. Kids Kottage Foundation continues to add significant value to the community with our twenty-four-hour, seven days a week, three hundred and sixty-five days a year crisis line. We are continuing to provide shelter, food, clothing, and trauma-informed care to infants and children up to ten years of age. As well as, immediate support for caregivers experiencing crisis, homelessness, addictions, poverty, health, and food insecurity through our Follow-up Program.

Kids Kottage Foundation is positioned to foster resilience despite current challenges, and we will continue to deliver on our value statement of keeping infants and children safe and families strong. Together, we are building a stronger and more vibrant community.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS






KOTTAGE CLIENTS IDENTIFY AS




OF CHILDREN PER HOUSEHOLD


NATIONAL CHILD DAY

Our mission is to ensure every infant and child is kept safe, and their families are provided with the resources they need to build a strong and resilient future. We operate 24 hours a day, 365 days a year ensuring children's basic needs are met, and connecting their caregivers with the resources they need.
